## Dear Representative:

On behalf of our 3 million members and the 50 million students they serve, we would like to submit the following comments in connection with tomorrow's hearing on the consequences of immigration for K-12 schools.

Educators stand ready to educate all students, regardless of their place of birth or immigration status. NEA member <u>Missy Testerman</u>, <u>National Teacher of the Year</u>, embodies their welcoming spirit. She also shares their concerns about what happens when elected officials demonize immigrants in public statements or on social media.

"[Demonizing immigrants] emboldens other people to feel as though it's appropriate to also say those things, and children are a reflection of what they hear," <u>Testerman said</u>. "Sometimes, that language makes it back into the school day, and it's hurtful. It's hurtful to my students, it's hurtful to their families, it's hurtful to me."

Funding shortfalls in K-12 schools are neither new nor driven by immigration. Due to the deep cuts and funding caps imposed by the Budget Control Act of 2011, federal education funding has declined by \$13.6 billion (after adjusting for inflation). To reverse this tragic trajectory, we call on Congress to commit to helping fund our public schools to meet the needs of ALL students.
